### From the Rabbi

Dear Friend,

In the month of January, KTI partnered with local churches to share and spread the message of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. By bringing members of our congregations together, we were able to acknowledge our common roots while celebrating our diversity.

On January 16, KTI hosted All Souls Parish Presbyterian Church, St. Paul's Lutheran Church, and St. Peter's Episcopal Church for an evening about prayer. Members of each community joined together in our sanctuary to learn about Jewish prayer – how it started, how it evolved, and what it is all about. Afterward, Reverend Bruce Baker, Pastor Jim O'Hanlon, and Reverend Hilario Albert responded to the conversation using the lens of each of their traditions.

# K.T.I. Early Childhood Program

It is hard to believe it is already the end of January 2014! It seems as though we were just celebrating Hanukkah and the New Year a moment ago.

The ECP has been very busy since our last update. On January 2<sup>nd</sup> all the threes and fours came back to school in furry slippers and comfy PJ's to have a fun pajama day! There were delicious pancakes and cereal for snack and the children made dream-catchers too!

So far, we've had lots of snow and the children are loving it! They are learning about winter and the many exciting things that happen when snowflakes arrive and the temperature drops. They have been studying migration and that some birds fly to warm climates and others stay up north. Bright red Cardinals and Blue Jays are not only on the classroom bulletin boards but are happily living in the beautiful trees outside the ECP windows! The 4's classrooms have "maps" that show where birds fly to when they need to keep warm. It seems that many birds visit grandparents in Florida, Arizona, Texas and even as far as California!

All of the children are fascinated with hibernation so we had a special "Bear Day" for the 2's, 3's and 4's in the ballroom! They pretended to be bears sleeping in dens for their long winter naps--they had a pretend bear hunt, made and ate special 'bear treats' and read wonderful bear stories.

Two important holidays also came in January: Tu B'Shevat, the holiday of the trees, and Martin Luther King Jr. Day. For Tu B'Shevat, the children learned how important trees are for us and the environment through stories and fun projects. Though our school teaches tolerance and understanding of all people every day, on Martin Luther King Jr. Day, we make a special point of emphasizing how important it is to accept and enjoy the differences in people.

In addition to the regular classroom winter curriculum, ECP children enjoy all of our visiting specialists. ### **PASSOVER 2014-5774**



#### PREPARING THE HOME

Because Passover is essentially a family celebration in the home, elaborate customs have developed in preparation for the holiday week. The house is cleansed of all *chametz*, and only after this, when the house is completey kosher for Passover, may Passover food be brought into the kitchen or placed in the refrigerator.

The first step is to remove all chametz and all other foods inappropriate for use during Pesach. Store this food in the garage, a locked or secured closet, or donate it to a food bank. The remaining shelves and cabinets should be cleaned and lined. If your family has a separate set of dishes, pots, pans and utensils for use solely at Passover, no special preparation is needed prior to their use. Kitchen objects which have been used during the year and have been in contact with chametz require an appropriate kashering process before they are used during Passover. Not all objects can be kashered for Passover. Consult an authority if necessary. Utensils used for broiling must be kashered by heating over an open fire; objects used for cooking are kashered by immersion in boiling water, and utensils used only for cold food may be kashered by rinsing. Counter tops, stoves, ovens refrigerators, freezers, microwave ovens, sinks and all other objects which have had contact with chametz must be thoroughly cleansed and kashered for Passover. Those objects which cannot be cleansed of their chametz, such a counter tops (Formica, etc.) should be covered with aluminum foil. With the kitchen purged of chametz, the kosher le Pesach dishes and utensils are placed in the cabinets and the kitchen is ready for Pesach. Don't forget to cleanse the chametz from the rest of your home, car(s) and office. Children can participate in the process by cleaning their own rooms, searching for crumbs and any other residue of chametz.

### בְּעוּר חָמֵץ Burning the Hametz

The morning of the Eve of Passover (and the First Seder), the leaven is burned, or otherwise obliterated, and the following recited:

May all the leaven in my possession, whether I have seen it or not, or whether I have removed it or not, be regarded as non-existent and considered as mere dust of the earth.

### SYMBOLS OF THE SEDER

Three whole matzah should be set before the leader of the seder. Custom has been that these are contained in a special three-section matzah cover. Why three? The top and bottom matzah correspond to the two challah which tradition ordains for Shabbat. The third piece represents the matzah which Jewish law specifically ordains for Pesach. Over the centuries, the three matzah have acquired special symbolic associations. Some say they represent the three patriarchs. Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. Others associate the matzah with the three categories of Jews in ancient times—Cohen, Levite, and Israelite.

Afikoman, or dessert—the middle matzah, which is hidden away as the object of a search by children at the end of the seder. The afikoman is the last food eaten at the seder meal.

Four cups of wine—symbolic of freedom and happiness. They refer to the four promises God made to the Jewish people in Egypt: "I will bring you out," "I will deliver you," "I will redeem you," and "I will take you to me for a people."

The *seder* plate, placed before the leader, contains the various symbolic foods referred to in the *seder* itself:

A roasted shankbone—symbolic of the paschal offering brought to the Temple in Jerusalem in ancient times. This also represents the special Passover sacrifice on the eve of the exodus from Egypt. Many Jews also see the shankbone as a symbol of God's "outstretched arm," helping the Jewish people in times of trouble.

Maror or bitter herbs—usually a horseradish root or romaine lettuce, symbolic of the bitterness our ancestors experienced as slaves in Egypt.

Karpas—a vegetable, usually parsley, symbolic of spring and its spirit of hope, as well as the Jew's undying faith in the future. Any green vegetable is permitted, and many Jews use lettuce or celery instead of parsley.

A roasted egg—traditionally symbolizes the continuing cycle of life. In addition, there are those who see the egg as a symbol of the Jewish people's will to survive. Just as an egg becomes harder the longer it cooks, so the Jewish people have emerged from persecution as a strong and living people.

Charoset—usually a combination of apples, wine, nuts, and cinnamon which symbolizes the mortar that our ancestors used to make bricks in Egypt when building the "Treasure Cities of Pharaoh."

Salt water—symbolic of the tears our ancestors shed in Egypt. We dip the *Karpas* in it.

Elijah's cup—set in the center of the table and filled at the end of the meal. After the cup is filled, we go to the door to greet the Prophet Elijah, after telling the inspiring story of our ancestor's deliverance from Egypt.

### THE RABBINICAL ASSEMBLY PESACH GUIDE

What follows is a general guideline. You may wish to consult with Rabbi Alpert if any doubt arises. Kosher le-Pesach labels that do not bear the name of a rabbi or one of the recognized symbols of rabbinic supervision, or which are not integral to the package, should not be used without consulting the rabbi.

### Did You Know...

Congregation KTI participates in the Westchester Jewish Basketball League (WJBL). This league was founded over thirty years ago and is dedicated to enriching Jewish youth with the values of sound athletic bodies, sportsmanship and friendship, in an atmosphere of harmony and increased participation in sports. It currently features more than 80 different teams, representing over 20 synagogues and JCC's from throughout the county. The league is comprised of four different divisions broken up by age group. Participant teams range from 5<sup>th</sup> grade through 12<sup>th</sup> grade.



There are currently six different KTI basketball teams that participate in this competitive league. Congregation KTI fields teams of 6<sup>th</sup>, 7<sup>th</sup>, 8<sup>th</sup>, 9<sup>th</sup>, 10<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> Graders. The players are predominantly congregants and the coaches are parents and sometimes older siblings of the players. KTI has had participant teams in the league for many years and has had a great deal of success in competition. The teams often remain together intact from 5<sup>th</sup> grade through high school and provide an opportunity for KTI youth to play and compete together as a team in a fun and athletic environment. The season began around Thanksgiving and concludes with a playoff in March. Games are held at various synagogue and school gyms throughout the county all day Sunday and weeknights from Monday through Thursday. If you are aware of any games, come on down and root for KTI.

We recently went to the Jewish Museum to see the Chagall exhibit and while there, visited our old KTI Torah ark and chairs, and the Ibram Lassaw bimah sculpture and eternal light (see photo below). It was very meaningful to be able to reconnect with this important and moving sculpture and light, commissioned by Philip Johnson, and the simple suite of oak furnishings (ark, chairs) that was created by Johnson specifically for our bimah in his perfectly-designed sanctuary. They can be viewed at The Jewish Museum (1109 5th Avenue at 92nd St.), where they are part of its permanent collection, in recognition of their religious and artistic value.

Kneses Tifereth Israel is a classic example of 1950s synagogue design that reflects the growth in American Jewish life in the post-war era when more than 500 synagogues were built throughout the United States. Philip Johnson (1906-2005) was one of the leading American voices for Modernism, first as head of the Museum of Modern Art's architecture and design department in the 1930s, and subsequently as a leading architect. Kneses Tifereth Israel was his only synagogue design. He undertook the commission for no fee as a public atonement to the Jewish people for his pro-fascist activities in the 1930s. In its adoption of a Modernist style, the Port Chester congregation reflected the movement at the time to develop new themes and forms appropriate to the contemporary synagogue.

When Kneses Tifereth Israel opened in 1956, Philip Johnson turned to Ibram Lassaw to commission a suite of works for the bimah (the platform in a synagogue from which the Torah is read). These included a large bimah screen (entitled Creation and measuring approximately 31 feet x 12 feet), an eternal light, and a menorah. In addition, Johnson designed the Torah ark (of English oak decorated with bronze Hebrew letters made by Lassaw) and other furnishings including a number of bimah chairs of English oak. In 2006, when Kneses Tifereth Israel decided to renovate the sanctuary, the Lassaw and Johnson suite (with the exception of the menorah) was sold to The Jewish Museum.

Creation, Lassaw's bimah screen for Kneses Tifereth Israel, is his most monumental work. In 1986, Lassaw described Creation as "a symphony structured in space rather than sound . . . inspired by the starry fields, the galaxies and galactic clusters of which we are a part."




