Arthritis Service Expansion Planned

Plans for a "significant expansion" of the headquarters of Westchester Division, Arthritis Foundation, New York Chapter, were announced Thursday at the annual bridge luncheon of the division at American Yacht Club.

Raymond Lockwood of Scarsdale, chairman of the division's advisory board, said the expansion of staff and services will make it possible to provide information on sources of specialized medical care for arthritis, and on community agencies available to help solve related problems in addition to the education materials, advice and guidance now being given. He said it also would be possible "to assess gaps in services needed by arthritics in the county and to develop new programs to meet these needs."

Malcolm Wilson To Address Graduates

Lt. Gov. Malcolm Wilson will address the 149 graduates of the College of New Rochelle at the 59th annual commencement exercises on Monday, at 10:30 a.m. on the campus.

Francis Cardinal Spellman, Archbishop of New York, will preside.

Commencement weekend will begin on Saturday, June 4, with a noon Mass for the graduates to be celebrated by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Edward Soares, college chaplain. Luncheon will follow at 1 p.m.

The traditional ceremony at which the graduates receive their bachelor of arts hoods is scheduled Sunday, June 5, at 2 p.m. in the sports building on campus. Academic awards and honors will be conferred. A reception for faculty and graduates and their families will follow on the campus lawn.

Lt. Gov. Wilson, who is a resident of Yonkers, has been in state service since 1939, serving as assemblyman from Westchester for 20 years before his election to his present post in 1958. During his service in the Assembly, he was co-sponsor of legislation which created the Higher Education Assistance Corporation, which helps needy college students.

Mr. Wilson, also sponsored legislation which established the first state scholarships for nursing education.

The Baccalaureate Mass will be celebrated Sunday at 5 p.m. with Msgr. Soares as celebrant and the Rev. Eugene Burke, CSP, preacher. A buffet supper for graduates and their families will follow in Mother Augustine Gill Dining Hall.

Father Burke is associate editor of The American Ecclesiastical Review and a past president of the Catholic Theological Society of America. He formerly taught at Catholic University of America and Trinity College in Washington, D.C.
