Vinegar Joe's Daughter Recalls Nomadic Army Life

Editor's Note: Mrs. Ernest F. Easterbrook, the subject of this article is the niece of Col. John Stilwell, who makes his home at Ardenwood on North Broadway, and the daughter of the late Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell, who formerly resided in Yonkers.

HONOLULU — "You never get used to it," said Mrs. Ernest F. Easterbrook. "Moving in the service is like having a sock child."

"The news always comes as a shock. Then you do what you have to do. And pretty soon it's over and then you forget about it."

Mrs. Easterbrook described her reactions to her nomadic military life as she prepared to leave Hawaii to join her husband, Maj. Gen. Ernest F. Easterbrook, in Bangkok. The general, former commander of the 25th Division at Schofield Barracks, has been appointed chief of the U.S. Military Advisory Group to Thailand.

Always On Go
Nancy Easterbrook, a slim, attractive matron, thinks she may hold a record for movers, although she long ago lost track of the exact number. Her whole life, she said, seems to be one move after another.

She is one of five children of the late Gen. Joseph W. (Vinegar Joe) Stilwell, U.S. commander of the China-India-Burma theater in World War II. "We were always on the go with Dad," she said.

"Moving is far easier now than it used to be. Then you'd pack your own china in those crates with planks for sides. "Now the Army Transportation Corps moves right in and does it all. And I mean all."

She claims she knows people whose ash trays arrived at a new base with ashes still in them. "And one friend of mine," she said, "insists her garbage got packed right up and shipped along with everything else."

Speaks Some Chinese
Though Mrs. Easterbrook spent her childhood in China where her father was stationed, she's never been to Bangkok.

"I speak some Chinese," she said. "I think it's so important to speak a few words in the language of the country you're in."

"Dad was wonderful that way. When he'd go to southern China they'd take him for a northern Chinese. He spoke the dialect perfectly. But more im-

portant, he fell into the way of the people."

The only non-military member of her family today—besides her mother who lives quietly in Carmel, Calif.—is Dr. Benjamin Stilwell of La Jolla, Calif. Her brother, Brig. Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell Jr., is in Saigon.

Her sisters are married to colonels — Army Col. Ellis Cox, stationed at the Pentagon in Washington and Air Force Col. William R. Cameron, assigned to Lockbourne Field, Ohio.

The Easterbrooks' youngest son, Jim, 11, will join his parents after finishing his high school freshman year this June.

Their daughter, Nancy, will spend her summer vacation from the University of California, Berkeley, in Bangkok.

The Easterbrooks have another son, John, an Army second lieutenant stationed at Fort Carson, Colo.

Mrs. Easterbrook said she is "astounded and delighted by the many friends you make in the service. I think that's one reason why people stay in the service."

"You meet wonderful people who are friends of friends and it goes on and on."
