Utility vote defeat near

But Con Ed Chairman Charles Luce said Monday he was so sure this was false that he pledged to "use our best efforts to keep rates at or below" the rates the consultants say a county utility would charge in its first projected year of operation. 1982. (The county consultants, R.W. Beck and Associates, say Con Ed's rates will rise 25 percent over the next four years. while a county utility would charge 21 percent over current rates in 1982.)

Luce also promised to assist the Legislature in its attempts to convince the state Public Service Commission that Westchester should be placed in a separate rate region from New York City, also served by Con Ed. However, he said the company would not join the county in a lawsuit which he doubted would be successful.

He similarly expressed doubts that the county would convince a court to give an advance ruling on whether Westchester or Con Ed has used the proper assessment methods to determine the value of Con Ed's distribution system. But he said he would not fight efforts by the county to obtain this "declaratory judgment" to resolve Beck's claim that the property is worth \$369 million and Con Ed's claim it is worth \$1.2 billion.

More than 450 persons, many of them Con Ed employees fearful about jobs and pensions, jammed the legislative chambers and hallways for the drawn-out hearing at the County Office Building. White Plains. Their sympathies were apparent from the start when they booed DelBello, the first speaker.

The crowd gave its warmest reception to Patrick Gallagher, president of the local Utility Workers of America, who charged DelBello and others had completely ignored the employees when working out the details of their takeover proposals. DelBello later denied the charge.

In the course of the hearing, many of the same issues and questions surfaced that have plagued the legislators -Republicans and Democrats - during the last week.

Those advocating a November referendum fell into two main camps: those who felt anything was better than Con Ed and those who agreed with DelBello that only by creating a county utility, with legal standing, could the main issues be resolved. Some of these speakers noted that

The crowd overflowed the county board's high-ceilinged chambers in the County Office Building. packed the foyer and lined the halls almost to the elevators on the eighth floor.

The hearing kept County Executive Alfred DelBello and his advisors, and Con Ed board chairman Charles Luce and his advisors. up until well after 2 a.m. when the last of the spectators and legislators filed out of the board chambers.

The hearing provided moments of drama inside the chambers while outside nature provided a thunderstorm the likes of which some observers said they hadn't seen since July 13 a year ago, the night of the Con Ed blackout.

Fortunately, the lights stayed bright for the crowd which was the largest that anyone could recall attending a board hearing in recent years.

Not all of those attending were dispassionate observers. When DelBello, the first speaker of the evening, rose to urge the legislators to hold a November referendum on the takeover, he was loudly booed.

Luce was accorded a more favorable reception.

But the hero's welcome was reserved for Patrick Gallagher. president of Local 1-2 of the Utility Workers of America, the union which represents Con Ed workers.

Speaking in a voice that resounded through the chamber, and which was blamed for shattering the speakers of the public address system. Gallagher said the takeover plan jeopardized the jobs of "a decenter lot of people you will not find the peers of."

He charged that advocates of the takeover plan were "unconcerned about the fate of 3.000 decent people and I've got nothing but contempt for them."

His remarks touched off a debate between himself and County Legislator Ronald Tocci, D-New Rochelle, Tocci claimed he had made "numerous" calls to union

DelBello was not asking for accompanying authorization to issue \$750 million in bonds to accomplish the takeover. This, they suggested, ensured that Westchester would be protected from financial exposure if the plan turned out to be impractical.

Those against a November referendum discounted these suggestions, saying that creation of the utility would be viewed by the public as a commitment to the entire takeover proposal. Some of these speakers advocated total abandonment of the takeover plan, while others said the matter must be studied in much greater depth before a referendum should be considered.

chester County government will have to have resided in the county for 30 days and will have to continue to live in the county to keep their jobs. The law will not apply to anyone now employed who lives outside the county nor to those who are now employed and plan to move outside the county some day.

The law, sponsored by county Legislators Ronald Tocci of New Rochelle and Richard Brodsky of Greenburgh, both Democrats, was approved by the board on July 17 by a vote of nine to six. With 12 votes needed to override DelBello's veto of July 28, two members who were absent for the vote. Republicans Andrew Albanese and John O'Leary, voted for the override and the 12th vote came from board Chairman Andrew O'Rourke, another Republican, who switched his vote. O'Rourke had indicated previously that, while he opposed the idea, he felt that the board and not Del-Bello should set policy for the county.

Also voting for the override were Re publicans Leonard Spano. Edward Brady. Diane Keane, John Messina, Joseph Christiana, John Hand, and Democrat John De-Rario. Opposed were Democrats Steven Galef, Audrey Hochberg, James McPoland and Caroline Whittle, and Republican Edward Gibbs.

DelBello, in his veto, had called the proposed law 'regressive, inhibiting, unrealistic and seriously harmful" to the county A self-imposed, geopolitical boundary limits and imperils the ability to attract and keep the best possible talent." he said, and he questioned the need for the law pointing out that 96 percent of the county workers already live here. DelBello said that the most serious flaw in the law was a provision which permits the county board's Committee on County Officers to grant waivers of residency requirements in special cases, saying that the hiring and firing of workers was a responsibility of the executive, not the legislative branch

DelBello said he was disappointed by the override, but said he had not made up his mind whether to test the legality of the law in the courts

of the county utility plan. The proposal now is to vote first and find out the facts later," Luce said

Representatives of Westchester's business and financial community who spoke generally were opposed to the referendum, although not necessarily to the takeover plan.

William Olson, president of Peoples Westchester Savings Bank, said, "I agree the public ought to make the decision but it's a question of time.

John Lloyd, a vice president of the Robert Martin Corp. development firm, noted that a "five to 15 percent reduction (in electricity costs) would not affect the decisions of industry or their employees to reside or not reside here.

Lloyd added that borrowing the millions of dollars needed for the takeover could "wreck the county's credit rating." Instead of attracting industry with cheaper electricity, Lloyd warned that a county-owned utility company could become known as "Westchester's dilemma.

Leonard Hofstetter, plant engineer at the General Motors assembly division in North Tarrytown, was one of several speakers who suggested that maintaining reliable service is of greater importance to his firm than reducing rates five or 10 percent. Hofstetter said he doubted that the proposed county utility could assure reliability as well as private industry

that begins in July of 1979. Nonetheless, officials are already looking towards the surplus funds as away of repaying the \$6 million loan

The City Council passed last month a 2 percent increase in the utility tax designed to raise enough money to begin repaying the \$6 million loan in 1979.

Mayor Angelo R. Martinelli said once the amount of the surplus is certified by the auditors, he will propose eliminating the utility tax increase and earmarking the \$4.6 million for the four year loan repayment plan.

Councilman Cola said, however, that the will support using the surplus to actually increase the amount of the state loan in order to avoid the planned layoffs of 250 employees in the city's school system

Municipal governments usually anticipate a small surplus at the end of a fiscal year. In Yonkers, after the 1976-77 budget period, there was about \$200,000 left over. In the years leading to the fiscal crisis. however. Yonkers accumulated budget deficits of more than \$40 million.

The \$4.6 million surplus represents about 3.3 percent of the last year's \$151.5 million budget for both the city and the Baord of Education.

In addition to department savings and unanticipated revenues, the city was able to use \$1.9 million in teacher strike penalties to fund the Board of Education's budget last year.

A nine-day mourning period will follow. with a cardinal or other high-ranking prelate saying a special Mass in St. Peter's daily.

Requiem masses were being said in Catholic churches all over the world. Other Christians held prayer services in several nations in tribute to Pope Paul's work for unity among the separated churches.

Italy's bishops ordered all church bells to toll in mourning at noon and sunset today and on Saturday. The Italian radio and television observed a second day of mourning, replacing pop music and light entertainment with classical music
