### WHITE PLAINS—

A trio of highly rated quintets became the first to struggle to the finals plateau in the Westchester Amateur Basketball Tournament, last night, when the 36th annual Recreation Departments' cage classic began its second and final week at the County Center with another bulging program, this one consisting of 17 games plus a single forfeit.

Filling in three spots on Thursday's six game championship finals card were General Foods of White Plains in the Industrial Division, Senior bracket hopeful, the New Rochelle Marauders, and the Raiders from Mount Vernon's South Side Boys' Club, Midget Division power.

Their respective opponents will be known by the conclusion of this afternoon and tonight's 11 game whirl along with the pairings in four of tomorrow's six semifinals. The others are already set as Wednesday's menu already pits White Plains and a second South Side Mount Vernon team in a Light Junior stepping stone and still a third MVBC unit against Lud-Dales of Yonkers in an Intermediate next-to-last stop.

Matched against stubborn crostrown rival NBW, the General Foods athletes had a rugged time of it in the game that lasted longest into the night

before gaining their title berth in a 50-43 final that wasn't decided until well after 11 p.m.

Jack Jones and Charlie Tomasi were the main scoring cogs for the culinary kids, netting 17 and 16 respectively. ex-Stein ace Frank Richichi had 16 for the moneymen. Colliding at 8:30 tonight for the right to challenge the G.F. aggregation will be the Computers of White Plains IBM and Western Electric of Yonkers, the latter qualifying with 68-29 ease, last night, short-circuiting Nestle's as John Dixon showed the way with 20.

Marauders had to really claw their way to the Senior final by outlasting the stubborn Colts from Yonkers, 71-67. A hummer all the way, Lou Brown topped the Queen City team's offensive with 21. Hiawatha Spraggins whooped it up in defeat with 20. Montrose A.C., led by ex-Hendrick Hudson High greats Ed Snyder, Ed Lent and Pete Kelly,

dispatched the Village of Mamaroneck's Fenimore, 61-49, to gain a semifinal tonight. They'll face the Ossining Sportsmen. Chris Brice sparked the Fenimore attack with 14.

Lone Intermediate tilt of the Monday slate saw the South Side entry in that bracket put down the stubborn City Park Boys' Club of New Rochelle, 71-66, in an individual scoring race pitting the teams of Mount Vernon's Ulysses Pleas, 19, and Al Epps, 17, against Ernie Wade and Tom Green, 23 each...but not quite enough to carry off the win.

Four Junior frays were scheduled but only three came off as Elmsford could unearth but four players and had to forfeit to Ossining. Winners were Harrison in a 42-41 thriller over Pelham, Peekskill over Hastings, 38-27, and Port Chester over Greenburgh, 44-41.

# Golf's 'Michelangelo'

## Friends To Fete Joe Antinozzi, Westchester's 'Ace Of Clubs'

John Ellis Knowles, the distinguished sportsman from Rye, once referred to little Joe Antinozzi of Rye as the "Michelangelo of the golf club."

Knowles should know an expert when he sees one. He is, in fact, recognized by many as quite possibly the most astounding senior golfer in the world today.

The former United States Seniors' golf champion and many-time Apawamis Club titleholder has reserved a special spot in his golf heart for little Joe. And with good reason. Antinozzi makes, repairs and keeps in good working condition the golf clubs that Knowles has swung to golf glory.

Antinozzi, who figures he's made, repaired and worked on some million golf clubs during his 40 years in the business, will be honored by a host of friends and admirers with a testimonial dinner the night of Thursday, May 5. The party will be held at Risoli's Restaurant in Harrison, and chances are there will be a wild scramble for tickets when the "night" approaches. Antinozzi is that well-liked.

Antinozzi was introduced to golf as a caddy at Apawamis, along with Gene Sarazen, Tony Penza and Ed Sullivan. Later on he put in professional stints with such masters as Mike Brady, Craig Wood and Claude Harmon at Winged Foot and the late Jimmy Donaldson at old Fenimore, now Fenway. Joe rates all four as the "greatest pros I've ever known."

But it was his club-making schooling under the master clubmaker, C.S. Butchart, in Rye and White Plains, that convinced Antinozzi to concentrate on the designing and manufacturing phase of the game.

"Butchart woods were and still are considered among the finest ever made," says Joe. "And it was the education and schooling I received from him that made me the craftsman I am today."

The 5-6, 142-pound giant of the tee-trade still operates his little White Dot plant in Rye, and it's a beehive of activity from March through November.

Professionals from all sections of the county flock to Joe for club advice, repairs and design. Pros like Art Wall have been known to drive all day and night to have Antinozzi "fit" their clubs to their preferences.

Joe offers the following advice to linksters ready to swing into another season:

"Good fundamentals are essential. It follows that proper fundamentals make for proper

swinging of the golf club. Have your clubs fitted by professionals. Too many modern day clubs are made for big, strong players. Most are too heavy and too strong.

"The shafts should be fitted to the golfer. Sixty per cent of the players today are swinging clubs designed and made for experts. When in doubt, check with your golf pro. He's the expert."

Pretty sound advice from the "ace of clubs."

J. Ellis Knowles, incidentally, is serving as honorary chairman of the Antinozzi dinner. Serving on the arrangements committee are John Priscantelli of White Plains, Ric Casella of Eastchester, J.J. Gianduro of Port Chester, Mrs. Julian Fyied of New Rochelle, Larry Santoro of Larchmont and Peter Covino of Port Chester.
